### EVERGREENS (bare root 5/\$10)

N = US Native

S = Sun

PS = Part shade

Sh = Shade

**American Arborvitae** *Thuja occidentalis* N/S/PS

Pyramidal habit, easily shaped, durable in any type soil. Excellent dark green color, 40'-60', sun or light shade, moist soil. Good for windbreaks or hedges, medium growth rate 12" or more per year.

3 year seedlings, 7"-15"

**Japanese Black Pine** *Pinus thunbergii* S

Fast growing, long needled pine reaching 25' with excellent salt tolerance, thrives in exposed coastal settings. Full sun, dislikes poorly drained soil. Great for bonsai, too.

3 year seedlings, 10"-18"

**Colorado Blue Spruce** *Picea pungens* N/S

Striking color ranges from blue-green to silver-blue. Stiff needles with densely set horizontal branches. 60'-120' at maturity, slow growth rate 6"-12"/year. Tolerant of just about any location.

3 year seedlings, 7"-14"

**Balsam Fir** *Abies balsamea* N/S/PS

Popular Christmas trees, hardy with highly aromatic foliage. Cold hardy, reaches 60', sun or light shade, prefers cool humid moist conditions. Slow growth 6"-12"/year.

3 year seedlings, 6"-12"

## SHRUBS AND TREES

**American Persimmon (*Diospyros virginiana*)** N/S/PS  
Native fruit tree, eventually 30-40', bears orange fruits that are eaten fresh, in jams, pies, preserves, and loved by all birds and wildlife. Fragrant white flowers are an excellent nectar source for bees. Any well drained soil; taproots.

**Bare root 4"-8" 3/\$7**

**Apache Plume (*Fallugia paradoxa*)** N/S  
A 4' x 4' shrub native to western deserts, tolerant of a wide variety of soil; has small white flowers but most attractive when covered with pink silky seed pods that give the plant its name.

**2.5" pot \$5**

**Black Cherry (*Prunus serotina*)** N/S/PS  
Adaptable native cherry tree that can reach 60', white flowers in spring, for sun or light shade. A superlative wildlife plant: flowers attract bees and many types of butterfly; fruits attract many birds and mammals.

**Bare root 1'-2' 3/\$12**

**Black Gum (*Nyssa sylvatica*)** N/S  
Also called tupelo, this native deciduous tree grows slowly to 50', pyramidal form. Makes an excellent specimen, lawn or street tree; showy fall color can be yellow, red, or purple. Deer resistant.

**3" pot, 6"-8" \$7**

**Clematis 'Stolwijk Gold' (*C. alpina*)** S/PS  
Flowering vine 6'-8' with 2" purple bell shaped flowers that stand out against bright chartreuse gold foliage.

**4" pot \$11**

**Dwarf Fothergilla (*Fothergilla gardenii*)** N/S/PS  
Great small native shrub, reaching 3' x 3', with fragrant white bottlebrush flowers in spring and great fall color. Deer resistant.

**2.5" pot \$6**

**Downy Serviceberry (*Amelanchier canadensis*)** N/S/PS  
Very early blooming native shrub with showy white flowers mid-March, 10-20' at maturity. Edible reddish black berries can be used in pies, jams, etc (unless the birds get there first).

**Bare root 1'-2' 3/\$8**

**Gray Dogwood (*Cornus racemosa*)** N/S/PS  
Slow growing native shrub reaching 6'-10', white flowers in spring, purple-red foliage and white berries (loved by birds) in fall.

**Bare root 1'-2' 3/\$7**

**Blue Girl/Blue Boy Holly (*Ilex meserveae*)** S  
Cold hardy evergreen holly, with glossy dark blue-green spiny leaves, reaching 8'-10'; bright red berries on females. You will receive 2 Blue Girl and 1 Blue Boy (for pollination).

**Set of 3, in 3" pots 3/\$12**

**Hydrangea 'Blue Billow' (*H. serrata*)** S/PS  
A blue lacecap variety, slowly reaching 3' tall, 4' wide, for sun or light shade. Very hardy, no winter dieback.

**3" pot \$6**

**Oak Leaved Hydrangea 'Little Honey' (*Hydrangea quercifolia*)** N/S/PS  
A new, dwarf introduction of our native oak leaved hydrangea with golden yellow foliage, reaching only 4' x 4', white flowers, red fall color. Best in light shade.

**3" pot \$9**

**Dwarf Lilac 'Paliban' (*Syringa meyeri*)** S  
Compact spreading variety 6' tall, rosy lavender flowers, full sun, great for smaller spaces. Deer resistant.

**2.5" pot \$5**

**Potentilla 'Gold Drop' (*Potentilla fruticosa*)** S/PS/N  
Low growing shrub (3' x 3') with bright yellow flowers nearly all season (June - August)

**3" pot \$4**

**Red Chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*)** N/S/PS  
Medium sized native shrub (6'-8') with white flowers and long lasting red berries; fall color is truly exceptional. A great native replacement for the now-illegal burning bush.

**3" pot, 12"-15" \$6**

**Rhododendron 'Rosebay' (*R. maximum*)** N/S/PS/Sh  
Mature height 6'-10', spreading 5'-8'. Lustrous dark green leaves and pink flowers, sun to shade. Very hardy. Mulch lightly.

**6"-12" rooted cutting \$7**

**Rhododendron (*R. catawbiense* 'Album')** N/S/PS  
Large trusses of flowers, buds flushed lilac but open to pure white. Leaves are dark lustrous green, 6-8' tall and wide. Prune after flowering if necessary. Hardy and vigorous.

**6"-12" rooted cutting \$7**

**Scarlet Elder (*Sambucus pubens*)** N/S/PS  
Large (12') rapidly growing native shrub with big clusters of white flowers, followed by ornamental red berries. Berries are not edible (except by birds). Withstands hard pruning for shape.

**Bare root 1'-3' 3/\$9**

**Sweet Crabapple (*Malus coronaria*)** N/S  
Underused native crabapple to 25', very fragrant double pale pink flowers in spring., average to moist soil. Attracts bees, birds and wildlife.

**3" pot, 6"-8" \$7**

**Viburnum 'Winterthur' (*V. nudum*)** N/S/PS  
 Compact native shrub 6' x 6', fragrant white flower clusters in late spring, berries that start pink and turn blue-black. Sometimes called possumhaw.

2.5" pot \$5

**Weigela 'Fine Wine'** S  
 Elegant shrub 4' tall with dark burgundy foliage and pink trumpet shaped flowers. Deer resistant.

2.5" pot \$7

**Dappled Willow 'Hakuro Nishiki' (*S. integra*)** S/PS  
 Mounding shrub 5'-10' tall, showy pink shoots that give way to white and green variegated leaves. Tolerant of substantial pruning for shape, likes moist soil.

3" pot, 1'-2' \$5

## FRUITS

**Asparagus 'Jersey Knight'**  
 Vigorous male variety with uniform succulent spears, resistant to rust/fusarium. Space 12" apart in 6" deep furrows in a well drained sunny location, neutral pH, cover crowns with 2" of soil. Fill in as spears grow until furrows are filled. Water well first year.

**Blackberry 'Chester'**  
 Thornless variety, vigorous and winter hardy. Crop ripens mid to late August. Space plants 3'-4' apart in a well drained sunny location.

5 bare root plants/\$27

**Blueberry 'Blueray/Northland'**  
 One of each for best cross-pollination and fruit production. Both varieties are adapted for winter hardiness, reaching 4-5' in height. Soil pH must be 4.5-4.8. Space 4'-5' apart.

One of each variety, 18"-30"/\$27

**Raspberry 'Taylor'**  
 Summer bearing variety. Vigorous and productive, berries have great flavor for fresh eating or freezing. Space 18"-24" apart

10 bare root plants/\$27

**Rhubarb 'McDonald'**  
 Rhubarb is a very easy crop for the home gardener. Plant 3' apart in sun with top of division level with soil surface. Adding compost or manure yearly increases yields.

Bare root division \$10

**Strawberry 'Sparkle'**  
 Medium sized berries on exceptionally vigorous plants, a favorite with home gardeners for 60 years. One of the best for jam and freezing. Space 12" – 18" between plants, 3'-4' between rows.

## GROUNDCOVERS

**Phlox 'Minnie Pearl' (*P. maculata x glaberimma*)** N/S/PS  
 Short stature (12"-15"), spreading habit, and completely mildew free, blooming with pure white flowers in early summer, weeks before garden phlox.

2.5" plug 3/\$9

**Juniper 'Blue Rug' (*J. horizontalis*)** S  
 Creeping plant spreading to 6'-8', height 4"-6", silvery blue foliage that has a light purple tinge in winter. One of the shortest varieties.

3" pot 3/\$11

**Myrtle (*Vinca minor*)** PS/Sh  
 Vinca minor. 6" Small shiny evergreen foliage with violet blue flowers in spring for light to full shade. Fast spreading, tolerant of many locations. Plant clumps 10" apart.

Bare root clumps, 10-20 plants 5/\$5

**Pachysandra (*Pachysandra terminalis*)** PS/Sh  
 Spurge. Dense, lustrous green evergreen 8" tall, excellent in masses under trees or in difficult locations to replace lawn. Any soil, water liberally to establish. White flowers early April. Plant 6" apart to fill in 2 years.

## PERENNIALS

Old favorites, new varieties and lots of natives!

<b>Native Shade Garden</b>	<b>N/PS</b>	<b>\$20</b>
Our native shade garden collection includes five unusual plants suitable for a partly shaded woodland setting. All plants are 2.25" x 5" plugs:		
<b>Arkansas Bluestar</b> ( <i>Amsonia hubrichtii</i> ) – Feathery foliage, 2'-3', pale starry blue flowers, great yellow fall color.		
<b>White Wood Aster</b> ( <i>Aster divaricatus</i> ) – 2'-3', tons of small white flowers with a pinkish cast in late summer.		
<b>Turtlehead</b> ( <i>Chelone glabra</i> ) – White flower spikes, 2'-3', late summer, loves moisture.		
<b>Great Blue Lobelia</b> ( <i>Lobelia siphilitica</i> ) – 3', purple-blue flower spikes late summer, loves moisture.		
<b>Golden Groundsel</b> ( <i>Senecio aureus</i> ) – Golden daisies over shiny toothed leaves, 12", blooms in May.		

<p><b>Anemone 'Rubra'</b> (<i>Anemone multifida</i>)      <b>S/PS</b> Spring blooming anemone with carmine red flowers; 18" tall, blooms May-June. <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$4</b></p>	<p><b>Fern – Sensitive Fern</b> (<i>Onoclea sensibilis</i>)      <b>N/PS/Sh</b> Very large native fern, reaching 4' tall and wide. Likes average to swampy (not dry) soil, no full sun. Deciduous. Deer resistant. <b>3.5" pot</b>      <b>\$7</b></p>
<p><b>Bluebells of Scotland</b> (<i>Campanula rotundifolia</i>)      <b>N/S/PS</b> A true native despite the name, with tiny blue flowers on wiry stems beginning in early summer. Forms a 12" x 12" clump. <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$4</b></p>	<p><b>Gas Plant</b> (<i>Dictamnus albus 'Purpureus'</i>)      <b>S/PS</b> Erect spikes of pink flowers with darker pink veins in summer, 2'-3'. Gas plant is hardy and very long lived, but grows slowly; vapor emitted by the plant can be briefly ignited with a match on hot summer nights! Do not transplant once established. <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$4</b></p>
<p><b>Bleeding Heart 'Bacchanal'</b> (<i>Dicentra formosa</i>)      <b>N/PS</b> This cultivar of our native bleeding heart has deep maroon flowers set over ferny gray green foliage, flowering in April. Great for a native shady woodland garden. Deer resistant. <b>Bare root division</b>      <b>\$5</b></p>	<p><b>Ghost Plant</b> (<i>Artemisia lactiflora 'Guizhou'</i>)      <b>S/PS</b> Stately plant with black stems, off white astilbe-like flower spikes to 4', and dark foliage with a silvery cast. Dislikes dry soil but requires excellent drainage. <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$5</b></p>
<p><b>Canada Beachhead Iris</b> (<i>Iris setosa canadensis</i>)      <b>N/S/PS</b> Shorter iris native to the NE US and Canada, bright purple blue flowers with prominent veins, reaches 12". Prefers a cool moist site, does not like to dry out. <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$5</b></p>	<p><b>Coral Bells 'Melting Fire'</b> (<i>Heuchera sp</i>)      <b>PS</b> Selection of coral bells with bright red spring foliage turning maroon when mature, heavily ruffled edges. <b>3" plug</b>      <b>\$6</b></p>
<p><b>Columbine 'Leprechaun's Gold'</b> (<i>A.vulgaris</i>)      <b>PS</b> Spring bloomer with purple-blue flowers and variegated foliage splashed with gold and chartreuse, 24". <b>2.5" pot</b>      <b>\$4</b></p>	<p><b>Hellebore 'Brandywine Mix'</b> (<i>Helleborus sp</i>)      <b>PS/Sh</b> If you haven't tried hellebores, try ours at this great price! Great plants for the partial shade garden, flowering early spring; yours may be a red, pink, apricot or picotee. <b>3" pot</b>      <b>\$9</b></p>
<p><b>Daylilies</b>      <b>S</b> Long lived, low maintenance, easy perennials for sun, flowering in summer. Indestructible. All sold as bare root plants.</p> <p><b>'Catherine Woodbury'</b>    Pale orchid pink, 30"      <b>\$4</b> <b>'Eenie Weenie'</b>    Yellow 2" flowers, 10" tall      <b>\$4</b> <b>'Ruffled Apricot'</b>    Large 7" apricot flowers, 28"      <b>\$4</b> <i>and for a little more zing.....</i> <b>'Big Smile'</b>    Yellow petals with peach pink ruffled edges, 7" flowers on 28" plants      <b>\$10</b></p>	<p><b>Hostas</b>      <b>PS/Sh</b> Durable low maintenance foliage plants for part to full shade. All plants are bare root.      <b>3/\$10</b></p> <p><b>'Gold Standard'</b> – Gold-green leaves edged with darker green; best in part shade. 2' tall, to 3' wide. <b>'Aureomarginata'</b> – Green leaves with yellow borders, forms a 12"-16" mound. <b>'Royal Standard'</b> - Vigorous, dark green leaves with fragrant white flowers, 3' wide, 2' tall.</p>
<p><b>Fern – Interrupted Fern</b> (<i>Osmunda claytonia</i>)      <b>N/PS</b> Tall (3'-4') native fern with a vertical growth habit, sun tolerant when there is enough moisture. Deer resistant. <b>3.5" pot</b>      <b>\$7</b></p>	<p><b>Iris 'Silverado'</b>      <b>S</b> One of the taller varieties of bearded iris, 'Silverado' has icy pale blue/lavender flowers, blooming in May. Plant shallowly, with rhizomes barely covered by soil, full sun only. <b>3" plug</b>      <b>\$7</b></p>

**Mexican Hat (Red Form) (*Ratibida*)** N/S  
Tough as nails native wildflower 2'-3', with an upright central cone and drooping red petals, long blooming period, reseeds. **2.5" pot \$4**

**Oriental Poppy 'Royal Wedding'** S  
Huge 8" crepe-papery flowers with black centers on 3' stems in early summer. Will go dormant in late summer, best planted in the back of the border. Deer resistant. **2.5" pot \$4**

**Pale Purple Coneflower (*Echinacea pallida*)** N/S/PS  
Tall native coneflower with long pale pink spidery petals, reaches 3', blooms mid summer. Deer resistant. **2.5" plug \$4**

**Prairie Smoke (*Geum triflorum*)** N/S  
Native wildflower, nodding rosy pink flowers on 18" plants that give way to feathery gray seed heads; planted in masses these look like clouds of smoke. **2.5" pot \$4**

**Red Switch Grass (*Panicum 'Shenandoah'*)** N/S  
Native ornamental grass, 2', nice pinkish flowers but grown for its foliage: steely blue-green in summer turning bright red in fall. Deer resistant. **2.25" x 5" plug \$5**

**Purple Milkweed (*Asclepias purpurescens*)** N/S  
Lovely native rare in cultivation, intense rosy pink flowers, 2'-4', attracts butterflies – great substitute for the more invasive roadside milkweed. **2.25" x 5" plug \$5**

**Missouri Coneflower (*Rudbeckia missouriensis*)** N/S  
Native variety of coneflower, yellow blooms with black centers, 2'-3', very long bloom period late June-September. **2.5" pot \$4**

**Vervain (*Verbena hastata*)** N/S  
Blue Vervain is a native of sunny moist meadows, 2'-3', attracts butterflies, spikes of purple flowers. Self sows, average to wet soil. **2.25 x 5" plug \$4**

**Vine - Climbing Asparagus (*A. verticillatus*)** S  
Hardy climbing asparagus reaching 15', small white flowers in late spring and red berries in fall. A seldom seen but easily grown plant, ferny foliage resembles the indoor asparagus fern. **2.5" plug \$5**

**Vine - Hops Vine 'Cascade' (*Humulus lupulus*)** S  
Herbaceous perennial vine used for home brewing beer, reaching 8'-20' in a season. 'Cascade' is a popular, disease resistant strain with large flower cones. (Established plants yield 1-2 lbs hops/vine; a 5 gallon batch of beer requires about 2 oz.) **Bare root rhizome \$8**

## GARDEN SUPPLIES

**Black Gold** Improve your soil and fertilize your plants with Great Brook Farm's composted cow manure. Composted for over a year, and ready to use now. Bags of approximately 40 lb sold by volume, not weight. (Our volunteers will help you load bags into your car) **\$6/bag**

**Compost Bins** Made in MA from recycled soda bottles, bins are sturdy, lightweight and assemble without tools. 24 cubic ft capacity. A cone shaped aerator top and bottom speed up composting and keep out animals. **\$65**

**Neptune's Harvest Hydrolyzed Fish Fertilizer**  
Organic fertilizer made in MA from fresh North Atlantic fish. Processed to retain vitamins, enzymes, hormones and micronutrients, low odor formula. Concentrate; use 1-2 T per gallon of water. **16oz concentrate \$11**

**Fertilizer Tablets** 12-12-12 10 gram slow release tablets supply major nutrients needed by establishing plants for up to two years. Use 1 tablet at planting for all seedlings and transplants, 2 for plants 6" and larger, and 1 tablet per half inch diameter for trees. **15 tablets/\$5**

**Kitchen Scrap Buckets** Put these on your kitchen counter to collect kitchen waste for your compost pile! Composting is easy and provides nutrients and soil conditioner for your garden. These buckets have a tight fitting lid and oval shape for easy scraping of dishes. **\$11**

**SkyJuice Rain Barrel**  
Our 57 gallon rain barrels are made from refurbished food grade barrels and feature a removable lid, overflow outlet, and spigot for hose attachment. Your garden (no chlorine!) and wallet will thank you! Terra cotta color. **\$85**
