EVERGREENS (bare root 5/\$10)

N = US Native

S = Sun

PS = Part shade

Sh = Shade

American Arborvitae *Thuja occidentalis* N/S/PS

Pyramidal habit, easily shaped, durable in any type soil. Excellent dark green color, 40'-60', sun or light shade, moist soil. Good for windbreaks or hedges, medium growth rate 12" or more per year.

3 year seedlings, 10"-18"

Colorado Blue Spruce *Picea pungens* N/S

Striking color ranges from blue-green to silver-blue. Stiff needles with densely set horizontal branches. 60'-120' at maturity, slow growth rate 6"-12"/year. Tolerant of just about any location.

3 year seedlings, 8"-16"

Scotch Pine, French Highland Strain *Pinus sylvestris* S

Attractive specimen tree, develops scaling reddish gray bark and gnarled branches, reaching 50' w/medium growth rate. Tolerant of heat, drought, cold and poor soil. This strain has blue-green needles, makes a great Christmas tree.

3 year seedlings, 10"-20"

Balsam Fir *Abies balsamea* N/S/PS

Popular Christmas trees, hardy with highly aromatic foliage. Cold hardy, reaches 60', sun or light shade, prefers cool humid moist conditions. Slow growth 6"-12"/year.

4 year seedlings, 8"-16"

<p>Beautyberry ‘Early Amethyst’ S <i>(Callicarpa dichotoma)</i> Small shrub (4’) grown for its plentiful shiny amethyst-purple berries September to November. Easy and adaptable. Nice fall color. 3” pot \$6</p>	<p>River Birch (<i>Betula nigra</i>) N/S/PS Medium sized native tree, rapid growth to 40’-70’ with attractive peeling cinnamon colored bark for winter interest. Resistant to pests and diseases, likes moist to wet soils. 1’-2’ bare root 3/\$7</p>
<p>Bottlebrush Buckeye (<i>Aesculus parviflora</i>) N/S/PS Native shrub, to 12’ tall, 12’ wide, showy white flowers in 10” panicles in midsummer. Rare in the trade, makes an unusual landscape specimen., prefers a moist acidic soil. 3” pot \$8</p>	<p>Rhododendron ‘Rosebay’ (<i>R. maximum</i>) N/S/PS/Sh Mature height 6’-10’, spreading 5’-8’. Lustrous dark green leaves and pink flowers, sun to shade. Very hardy. Mulch lightly. 3” pot \$8</p>
<p>Butterfly Bush ‘Black Knight’ (<i>Buddleia</i>) S Shrub to 6’, full sun, absolute magnet for many butterfly species. Long spikes of dark purple flowers in late summer. Cut back to live wood in spring. 3” pot \$5</p>	<p>Rhododendron (<i>R. catawbiense</i> ‘<i>Album</i>’) N/S/PS Large trusses of flowers, buds flushed lilac but open to pure white. Leaves are dark lustrous green, 6-8’ tall and wide. Prune after flowering if necessary. Hardy and vigorous. 3” pot \$8</p>
<p>Buttonbush (<i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i>) N/S/PS Native shrub to 6’ in the northeast, globe shaped white flowers for much of the summer. Favorite nectar source of many butterflies and hummingbirds, likes swampy soil but will grow in ordinary garden soil that does not dry out. Bare root 1’-2’ 2/\$6</p>	<p>Smokebush ‘Royal Purple’ (<i>Cotinus coggygria</i>) S/PS Very attractive shrub to 15’, dark purple leaves, clouds of tiny flowers that give the appearance of smoke, scarlet fall color. Best color in full sun. 3” pot, 8”-18” \$5</p>
<p>Clematis viticella ‘Venosa Violacea’ S/PS Flowering vine 8’-10’, flowers have a white base with dark purple veins that can cover the whole bloom in full sun. Flowers June – September. 4” pot \$11</p>	<p>Spirea ‘Little Princess’ (<i>Spirea japonica</i>) S Very compact easy shrub, 2” pink flowers on a 2’-3’ plant, long blooming period, drought tolerant. 3” pot, 3”-6” \$4</p>
<p>Fragrant False Indigo Bush (<i>Amorpha nana</i>) N/S/PS Pinkish purple flowers with honey fragrance, May – July on compact plants 1’-3’ tall. 2.5” pot \$5</p>	<p>Summersweet ‘Vanilla Spice’ (<i>Clethra alnifolia</i>) N/S/PS Small native shrub (5’-6’) with large pure white, very fragrant flowers late summer – fall. Best in a moist partially shaded site, but tolerant of other situations. Attracts butterflies. 3” pot \$7</p>
<p>Hydrangea ‘Annabelle’ (<i>H. arborescens</i>) N/S/PS White mophead variety, reaching 5’ tall and wide. Much hardier than macrophyllas, no winter dieback, very reliable bloom. 3” pot \$7</p>	<p>Viburnum ‘Mohawk’ (<i>V. x burkwoodii</i>) S/PS Compact 8’ shrub, lipstick red buds open to pinkish white flowers with a spicy fragrance. Flowers early spring, fall color is orange-red. 3” pot \$6</p>
<p>Pussy Willow (<i>Salix discolor</i>) N/S Shrub/small tree to 18’, famous for its fuzzy silvery flowers in winter. Native, provides food for birds, host plant for many types of butterflies. Tolerant of many soil types, but prefers moist to wet soils, even poorly drained. Bare root 1’-2’ 2/\$7</p>	<p>Virginia Sweetspire ‘Henry’s Garnet’ N/S/PS <i>(Itea virginica)</i> Compact native shrub to 5’, long slender white flowers early summer that attract many pollinators; outstanding scarlet fall color, great choice to replace burning bush. 3yr seedlings, 1’-2’ 3/\$7</p>
<p>Nannyberry (<i>Viburnum lentago</i>) N/S/PS Large shrub/small tree to 15’, white flattened 3” flower clusters in spring, bluish fruit attracts birds, easy native. 3” pot, 2’-3’ \$5</p>	<p>Weigela ‘Pink Poppet’ (<i>Weigela</i>) S Showy tubular pink flowers on a dwarf shrub (2’ tall, 3’ wide) blooming April – June. 3” pot \$6</p>

Witch Hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*) N/PS/Sh
 Small multitrunked native tree, usually 15' but can reach 30', golden yellow fall color followed by spidery yellow flowers late fall/winter.
Bare root 1'-2' 2/\$8

Yellowtwig Dogwood 'Silver and Gold' N/S/PS
 (*Cornus sericea*)
 Multiseason shrub, yellow branches for winter interest, variegated foliage, white flowers in spring. Reaches 4'-10', tolerant of many soil types including wet.

FRUITS/EDIBLES

Asparagus 'Jersey Supreme'
 Vigorous high yielding male variety with uniform succulent spears, resistant to rust/fusarium. Space 12" apart in 6" deep furrows in a well drained sunny location, neutral pH, cover crowns with 2" of soil. Fill in as spears grow until furrows are filled. Water well first year.
25 crowns/\$13

Blackberry 'Chester'
 Thornless variety, vigorous and winter hardy. Crop ripens mid to late August. Space plants 3'-4' apart in a well drained sunny location.
5 bare root plants/\$27

Blueberry 'Blueray/Northland'
 One of each for best cross-pollination and fruit production. Both varieties are adapted for winter hardiness, reaching 4-5' in height. Soil pH must be 4.5-4.8. Space 4'-5' apart.
One of each variety, 18"-30"/\$27

Vine - Hops Vine 'Willamette' (*Humulus lupulus*) S
 Herbaceous perennial vine used for home brewing beer, reaching 8'-20' in a season. 'Willamette' is the most popular American aroma hop. (Established plants yield 1-2 lbs hops/vine; a 5 gallon batch of beer requires about 2 oz.)

Raspberry 'Nova'
 Summer bearing variety. Vigorous, dependable and productive, berries have great flavor for fresh eating or freezing. Plants begin bearing early summer for 4-5 weeks. Space 18"-24" apart.

Rhubarb 'McDonald'
 Rhubarb is a very easy crop for the home gardener. Plant 3' apart in sun with top of division level with soil surface. Adding compost or manure yearly increases yields.

Strawberry 'Sparkle'
 Medium sized berries on exceptionally vigorous plants, a favorite with home gardeners for 60 years. One of the best for jam and freezing. Space 12" - 18" between plants, 3'-4' between rows.

GROUNDCOVERS

Lady's Mantle (*Alchemilla mollis*) S/PS
 Beautiful scalloped gray-green leaves with tiny chartreuse flowers in spring. Mat forming, spreads slowly, self seeds somewhat. Lovely when wet with dew.

Juniper 'Blue Rug' (*J. horizontalis*) S
 Creeping plant spreading to 6'-8', height 4"-6", silvery blue foliage that has a light purple tinge in winter. One of the shortest varieties.

Phlox 'Candy Stripe' (*P. subulata*) N/S/PS
 Evergreen mat of foliage, with massed pink and white flowers in spring. 4"-6" tall.

Myrtle (*Vinca minor*) PS/Sh
 6" Small shiny evergreen foliage with violet blue flowers in spring for light to full shade. Fast spreading, tolerant of many locations. Plant clumps 10" apart.
Bare root clumps, 10-20 plants 5/\$5

Pachysandra (*Pachysandra terminalis*) PS/Sh
 Spurge. Dense, lustrous green evergreen 8" tall, excellent in masses under trees or in difficult locations to replace lawn. Any soil, water liberally to establish. White flowers early April. Plant 6" apart to fill in 2 years.

Our native late season garden collection includes five plants suitable for a partly shaded woodland setting. All plants are 2.5" plugs or pots. (No repeat from last year's collection):

Coral Bells 'Autumn Bride' (*Heuchera*) – Scalloped lime green leaves, pure white flowers Sept - frost. Bright shade.

Rudbeckia 'Henry Eilers' (*Rudbeckia*) – To 5', quilled yellow blossoms w/brown cones Aug-Sept. Sun/pt shade.

Joe Pye Weed 'Carin' (*Eupatorium*) – Great new color for Joe Pye Weed: silvery pink flowers, 5'-6'. Sun/pt shade.

Sunflower 'Lemon Queen' (*Helianthus*) – Perennial sunflower, tons of 2" yellow flowers, 5'. Sun.

Boltonia 'Snowbank' (*Boltonia*) – Masses of starry white flowers Sept-Oct, 4'. Sun.

Beardtongue (*Penstemon digitalis*) N/S/PS

Native wildflower, easiest penstemon for the northeast, white flower spikes midsummer, 24"-30".

Blue Flag Iris (*Iris versicolor*) N/S/PS

Beautiful native iris, yellow throated blue-violet flowers May-June. Native to marshes and wet meadows, will do well in average garden soil that does not dry out. 2'-3'.

Bellflower 'Dickson's Gold' (*C. garganica*) S/PS

Neat little variety, yellow-green foliage with deep blue flowers, only 4"-6" tall. Great for edgings, rock walls, etc.

Compact floriferous variety, pure white blossoms in spring, 24" tall

Coral Bells 'Silver Scrolls' (*Heuchera*) PS

One of the most attractive and vigorous heucheras, beautiful silver-purple striated foliage, small pinkish flowers.

Long lived, low maintenance, easy perennials for sun, flowering in summer. Indestructible. All sold as bare root plants.

Heart Leaved Alexander (*Zizia aptera*) N/S/PS

Native wildflower of meadows and woodland edges, yellow flowers May/June, reaches 1'-2' tall, heart shaped basal leaves.

Dragonhead 'Blue Dragon' (*Dracocephalum*) N/S/PS

Dense mound of foliage with deep blue snapdragon like flowers in early summer, 12"-15". Requires good drainage.

3" plug \$5

Dumbo's Ears (*Rudbeckia maxima*) N/S

Unusual native rudbeckia, basal rosette of huge leaves (the "ears"); flower spikes to 7', large yellow flowers with prominent cones July-September.

False Indigo 'Midnight Prairieblues' (*Baptisia*) N/S/PS

Large native wildflower, hybrid of two species, has spikes of midnight blue-violet pea like flowers in spring. Forms a large clump, to 4'

Feather Reed Grass 'Karl Forster' S/PS

(*Calamagrostis*) Vertical growth habit, 3'-6' tall, light pink flowers turn tan as the season progresses. Tall and graceful, one of the earliest grasses to flower.

Autumn Fern 'Brilliance' – pink fiddleheads, new growth is coppery orange, 2' tall and wide.

Athyrium 'Ghost' – silvery white finely textured foliage, 18" tall.

Foamflower (*Tiarella cordifolia*) N/PS/Sh

Native of eastern US woodlands, low growing burgundy-tinged leaves, small fuzzy white to pink flowers early spring. 8"-12". Spreads when happy.

Geranium 'Patricia' (*Geranium*) S

Magenta pink flowers on a spilling mound of foliage 2' tall and 3' wide, likes to trail through its neighbors. Very floriferous, long summer bloom period.

Eye catching native for a dry sunny site, spiny leaves in a rosette similar to yucca, thistle like bluish silver flowers.
